

Subtractions and Additions: Building A Personal Language

Supply list (please label your supplies) Elin Noble

In this class we will explore what happens when color is repeatedly added and removed through sequential shibori techniques. The resulting cloths are filled with luminosity, displaying sophisticated color nuances and visual complexity. We will use the Procion MX fiber reactive dyes, acid dyes, and thiox as the discharge agent, on cellulose fibers (cotton, rayon, Tencel, hemp and linen) as well as silk. We will cover the basics: learn why the different products are used and when to use them. We will also talk about color mixing, fabric selection, preparation and safety.

- · Scissors and/or thread snips
- Seam ripper
- 1 permanent black marker, such as "Sharpie" or "Rub-A-Dub" for name marking
- thimble (if you like to use one)
- Rubber gloves, a couple pair Casabella or Playtex-type household gloves that are at least 4-5" above your wrist. I also use glove liners, from outdoor sport or fishing supply stores, to wear under the rubber gloves for insulation, and protection of your hands from the hot discharge and dye baths.
- A few pair of disposable gloves
- smock/apron, work clothes, even old shoes you don't mind getting dye on.
- Questions, ideas, desires, and any troubleshooting fabric pieces you've dyed that stump you.

Vapor respirator fitted with acid/gas cartridges. Many of the new cartridges come with both dust/mist and acid/gas (or organic vapors), in one cartridge. Most new respirators have a silicone face piece that is very flexible. I can comfortably wear it for a long time without my glasses fogging up and without fitting problems.

Also, Google search "respirator with acid/gas cartridge" to find sources (I use a size SMALL – they are sized with men in mind). Recently I have found them in the painting department of many hardware stores. If you don't wear glasses and want to invest in a comfortable mask, consider a full face mask. You can comfortably wear this style for hours if you DO NOT wear glasses. Please contact me with any questions!

Fabric

3-5 yards total of washed (with soda ash and synthrapol OR a "free & clear" laundry detergent) and dried medium to dark commercially or hand-dyed cloth. Do not "soda soak" (leave the soda ash in the cloth) and do not use dryer sheets or fabric softener. No need to iron the cloth.

Bring mostly medium to dark solid color commercially dyed or hand-dyed cloth, and ½ yard of white PFD cloth. Cut the ½ yard of white cloth and ½ yard of a dark (commercial or hand-dyed) cloth into fat quarters You should have a total 4 fat quarters, two black and two white.

Choose a cellulose fiber such as: cotton, ramie, linen, hemp, rayon, tencel (rayon) or any combination of these. Bring silk along if you'd like, but not as your only fabric. Base how much fabric you bring on your speed, need for variety, project size, and ability to transport. Large amounts of any one fabric are not necessary. You may want to try different types of fabric, some good choices include: lawn, twill, broadcloth, sateen, challis, gauze, chiffon, organza, voile, velvet, velveteen and duck.

Convenient things to have - only if you are driving, have it, and/or have room, bring it.

- Hand sewing needles I like Millinery size 9, Quilt Basting size 7, and Doll Making needles (I will bring the thread for hand stitched shibori and a selection of needles to share).
- Soft pencil, chalk, or disappearing marker.
- Bring as many tubs or totes as is convenient: any size, from a plastic shoe box to a large tote. Look for a vessel that is larger in diameter than it is tall. This is the dye bath container. No buckets. The dollar store is a good place to look for inexpensive containers.
- Cone/spool of cord and/or string: crochet cotton, cotton weaving warp, kitchen string, light-weight twine, various thicknesses are fine, for pole wrapping arashi shibori techniques.
- . Spray bottle, such as a plant mister.
- 4-6 clamping devices you wish to bring (c-clamps, bulldog, paper clips, squeeze/spring clamps, bag clips, hair clips, etc.) When looking for spring clamps choose the plastic ones, instead of the ones that are mostly metal (I use 6" and 9" the most). The folded fabric and shaped blocks need to fit between the jaws of the clamps.
- Shapes for clamping: jar lids, wood or plexi shapes to clamp fabric in-between. Bring round, square, rectangle, or asymmetrical shapes. You need pairs or multiples of each shape, they don't need to be thick. You can cut your own from Plexiglas or any type of wood, even plywood, or get them as shapes at Michaels or The Dollar Store.
- PVC plumbing pipe: one or more 1-3 foot lengths of 1"-4" diameter PVC plumbing pipe smaller diameter is okay. Do not bring any piece longer than 3 feet. The art center has a selection for us to use.
- One 3' to 4' length of polypropylene or nylon braided or coiled rope, 1/2" or larger diameter (from boating supply stores and hardware stores).
- Dyes & Paints book to use as a reference guide.
- *3-in-1 Color Tool* by Joen Wolfrom to use as a color mixing reference guide.
- If you have a dye color-mixing reference notebook (such as a sample/formula notebook that you have developed or have produced in workshops) for MX Fiber Reactive dyes, you might enjoy using it for this class.
